

MICHIGAN MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT CHECKLIST



Knowing what to do after a crash can protect both your health and your claim. Use this checklist as a simple guide after a Michigan car accident.



Call 911 and Check for Injuries Immediately

It is important to have police and emergency medical personnel respond to the scene. Check on yourself and others involved in the crash, as motorcycle injuries are often more serious and may not be immediately obvious. Call 911 right away for anyone who may need medical attention or is unable to do so themselves.

Move to a safe location if you are able. If possible, get out of traffic and away from further danger. Staying visible and out of harm's way can help prevent additional injuries after the crash.



Document The Crash Scene

Take clear photos of vehicle damage, the surrounding area, road conditions, and anything else that may help explain how the accident happened.



Speak Carefully at the Scene

When speaking with police or others, stick to the facts. Do not guess, speculate, or admit fault.



Collect The Following Important Information

- » The other driver's name, phone number, and address
- » Driver's license number and license plate number
- » Insurance company and policy information
- » Vehicle details such as make, model, and color
- » Names and contact information of any witness



Report the Accident to Your Insurance Company

If the crash involves injuries, death, or significant property damage, you are required to report it to your insurance company. Many insurers allow you to file a claim through a mobile app or online. If not, contact your agent once you have left the scene and are able to speak safely.
